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Clarifying the Religious Status of La Vida Mission

Since the **"Independent/Supporting Ministries: Guidance for Engaging in the Relationship"** Prepared by The Rocky Mountain Conference, for use by RMC Employees and Institutions, which (to quote it) "are designed to help you assess whether access should be granted to an independent/supporting ministry, and if so, what safeguards must be in place to protect you from liability for their actions" was released and circulated and that a connection between SDA Conferences and Self-Supporting ministries was carefully guarded, apparently there seems to be some misunderstanding and the misconception that La Vida Mission is no longer a Seventh-day Adventist facility because it has pulled away from the Conference and no longer want to do anything with it. This is not true and because we have received many inquiries and questions as to what La Vida Mission's Status is now, our Mission Leadership decided to write this article to clarify the issue.

Our La Vida Mission Employee Handbook, Section 11.2 page 26 states that "La Vida Mission is a self-supported Seventh-day Adventist Mission station within the continental United States of America. Founded in 1961, LVM has become a 501 (c) (3), non-profit corporation witnessing for Jesus to the world". Therefore, La Vida Mission is a bona-fide non-profit religious organization that espouses the beliefs and practices of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. Section 11.3 on La Vida Mission Church further stipulates: "Following the apostolic commission given by our Lord (Matt. 28:19-20) we strive to proclaim the good news of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus to the neighboring community & beyond. La Vida Mission Church is a member of the Rocky Mountain Conference of Seventh-day Adventists sisterhood of churches. It shares a pastor with the Farmington, NM church. Church officers are elected by a nominating committee and follow the policies and procedures of the SDA church manual and the North American Division of SDA. Mission employees agree to practice and accept the teachings & practices of the Seventh-day Adventist church. Mission staff, including teaching staff as well as all members of the team are encouraged to attend the local church at least ¾ of monthly services".

Therefore, while La Vida Mission is a self-supporting ministry which is not under the Rocky Mountain Conference, we do maintain a good relationship with the Seventh-day Adventist Church and a good supporting relation with the Conference as well. Our Seventh-day Adventist Church on campus sends a regular monthly Tithes and Offering remittance to Rocky Mountain Conference, we have our own Church Board that runs and operates the church and while RMC cut our yearly financial support from the Conference Advance offerings, their Community Service Department under the directorship of Cathy Kissner, still does their Annual Donation Drive for and on behalf of La Vida Mission.

We hope that this article will clear the confusion in our readers' and supporters' minds. Please continue to support the ministry of La Vida Mission to the Navajo Native Community and beyond through your prayers and generous financial support. Fall Board and Constituency Meeting News

The annual La Vida Mission Board and Constituency Meeting was held on Sunday, October 15, 2023. Board and Constituency members came from New Mexico, Colorado, California, Utah and Arizona. Some came earlier on Sabbath to join us for worship and others drove in early Sunday morning with prayers in their hearts for the guidance and leading of the Holy Spirit.

Constituency meeting was held first in the morning, attended by all Constituency and Board members with the La Vida Mission staff as invitees. Highlights of the meeting were the State of the Mission and Financial Report respectively read by Dorie Panganiban, LVM Admin Team Chair and Carol Gillham, Board Treasurer. Round-table meetings and discussions with different departments of the Mission by all Board and Constituents followed. During this round-table discussion, department heads and the Board and Constituency members were given time to meet in small groups. Department heads were able to share and discuss the current status as well as the progress of their respective areas of ministry and the board and constituents were given the chance to not only ask questions and see the needs and challenges of the whole Mission, but most of all to explore together with our department heads and staff possible opportunities for improvement and growth. Other highlights of the Constituency meeting that morning were the reelection of 5 Board members, Vicky Pioche, Carol Gillham, Doug English, Doug Parks and Edison Tso and the election of additional Constituency members, Brad Beierle and Tobin Savage. Recommended too, as an added Constituency member, was Irene Henry. Pastor Dale Wolcott was also given the time to update the group about the Dine Adventist Radio ministry before the morning meeting concluded. After less than an hour lunch break, the Board of Directors gathered in the church fellowship room to meet and discuss specific agenda items such as the proposed amendments for the LVM Employee Handbook and School Handbook which were unanimously accepted and approved and the election of Dr. Robert Gardner as the new La Vida Mission Board president after Lee Vorhies officially tendered his resignation as president of the Board.

The mission is located off Highway 371, 55 miles north of I-40, just south of mile post #56, or 50 miles south of Farmington, New Mexico.

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Water Project Update

Hello Brothers and Sisters,

I am so excited to tell you that because of your generous donations, the Water Project has met it's minimum financial goal! Thank you and THANK GOD! Without you, this would not have been possible. The total raised for the Water Project is \$162,237, expenses have been \$58,673.85 with a balance of \$103,563.15.

We are still waiting for the NM Environment Department's approval of our Application for Modification of a Public Water System that was submitted in August. We are praying that the application will be approved by November 15, 2023. Once the application has been approved, we can move forward, weather permitting, to complete the foundation for the new tank, re-route distribution lines and have the new tank installed.

The re-design of the Community Water Hydrant has not been completed as of this writing, but it is possible that this part of the project can be completed before winter weather sets in.

The last of the project is to affirm that our water is sourced from ground water, rather than surface water, something we cannot determine until the new tank is in place.

Please continue to pray with us that the entire project can be completed as soon as weather and approval warrants. I will continue to update you about the progress of the project.

God bless each of you and, again, I thank you for your support.

This huge project is now fully funded, thanks to faithful donors like yourself. We are now waiting for the permits to be approved so that we can complete the task and get the tank installed, hopefully very soon.

Now we have a new project that needs funding. Although not as expensive as the water tank, it is desperately needed. Our "new" tractor of only about 5 years lost its diesel engine and it was too costly to repair. Our roads are in very bad condition because we have been without a tractor for some time while we were waiting to get the water tank project completed. We need to raise funds to purchase a heavier duty, stronger tractor. We have done some research and the cost for the tractor we need will be about \$40,000. Some have suggested that we finance and get it right away, but La Vida Mission bylaws state that we will not go into debt for anything, and we want to honor the guidelines set up by our founders so we patiently wait for the tractor. The Lord will provide for our needs when He sees fit.

Thank you again for your prayers and generous support and remember us during this season of giving. And please, while you are giving to the tractor fund, please don't neglect our operating funds.

And, by the way – I will put up the first \$1,000 for the new tractor. Who will match my donation?

We have another decomposition experiment, this time it is some pumpkin. Do you have a guess as to how long it will take?




